# OUR COMMUNITY IN A PERIOD OF CHANGE

On behalf of the Board and Executive Director of Nine Circles, thank you to our members and supporters for your contributions over the past year.

This year Nine Circles continued to be challenged to deliver high-quality health and social services within the ever-evolving COVID-19 reality. We are so appreciative of the Nine Circles community for their resiliency and dedication through this challenging time. The Nine Circles team has worked hard to maintain and improve access to essential community resources, shifting and constantly adapting as we learned more about COVID-19 and received feedback from agency clients and community partners. A particular thanks to those staff members who have been, and remain, redeployed internally or externally during this challenging time.

This past year, Nine Circles continued to find success in priority areas, including:

#### NINE CIRCLES AND THE MB HIV/ STBBI COLLECTIVE IMPACT NETWORK: EXPANDING ACCESS TO PREVENTION AND TESTING

Throughout the COVID-19 experience, rates of HIV and STBBI infections have continued to rise. Additionally, access to testing, treatment and safer sex and drug use supply became more difficult. However, the Nine Circles team was able to adapt to support ongoing testing and treatment both onsite and in collaboration with our Manitoba Association of Community Health Centre partners. Additionally, we were able to maintain access to harm reduction services and, in fact, strengthen our model of service over this year through the formation of The Pit Stop and improved integration among program team members



for increased coverage and collaboration.

Nine Circles collaborates with REACH Nexus to bring you to the next stage of community-owned testing options with self-testing for HIV. This collaboration is working to introduce self-testing technology to the community and launch the <a href="Event-Based STBBI Testing Toolkit">Event-Based STBBI Testing Toolkit</a>, designed to support agencies and communities to integrate STBBI testing into new spaces free of stigma or systemic barriers that can prevent testing. Nine Circles and our partners will pilot this toolkit in the year ahead.



CALLING FOR ACTION IN OUR COMMUNITY: EXPANDING ACCESS TO PREP. TASP. PEP AND NALOXONE

Over the past year, Nine Circles has and will continue to advocate for a range of systemic changes to better meet the needs of the population we serve. Our advocacy includes universal HIV treatment coverage, improved access to PrEP, PEP, Naloxone and Narcan, managed alcohol programming, safe consumption and safe drug supply. This year we have worked

to rally continued support as we call on Manitoba Health to fund TasP, PrEP and PEP fully. Members are encouraged to join this effort by signing a draft letter, available through our <u>website</u>. For more information on these technologies, go to ninecircles.ca to learn more.

Throughout COVID-19, Nine Circles partnered with a range of agencies to advocate for lower threshold access to Naloxone, including lessening the requirement for clinician involvement in training. This effort was successful, significantly simplifying the process and increasing kits distributed to clients. We have also partnered with Manitoba Harm Reduction Network and Councillor Sherri Rollins to advance supervised injection services in the City of Winnipeg.

## ENSURING EVIDENCE-BASED PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

Moving forward, Nine Circles will use new research and project partnerships in the coming year to further explore how we can best serve the broad range of clients we see and how we can expand our collaborations throughout the community. Projects this year will explore more deeply how we can better serve our community through initiatives like the Northern Journey Mapping Project: Migration and Health Study, HIV Stigma Photovoice, HIV Community Readiness Assessment Guide for First Nations, Manitoba 2SGBQ+ Men's Health Study, Methamphetamine Use in Manitoba Evidence to Action and more.

## 2020-2021: A YEAR IN REVIEW – AN UNEXPECTED ROLLER-COASTER

The COVID-19 pandemic had everyone at Nine Circles doing things differently this year. Whether it was creating new COVID-19 friendly procedures, shifting to a virtual Red Ribbon Walk & Run, or serving clients virtually over Zoom, it has been a year of confronting new challenges and creating new solutions. Nine Circles continued to find success throughout the obstacles and create change even in this roller-coaster year. Here are just several of the projects and initiatives we've been working on during the past year and their impact on our community.

#### LAUNCHING THE PIT STOP

"We're here to work with you to help get you to your next stop, judgement-free."

The Harm Reduction Services team at Nine Circles is always looking at ways to increase access and reduce harm, and our Health Educators and Health Education Facilitators were busy doing just that. Our Health Educator Facilitators launched The Pit Stop, a point of contact for referrals and harm reduction supplies at Nine Circles' main reception. Clients and community members can access an assortment of free items, such as hygiene and menstrual items, footwear, wound care kits, food and beverages, as well as drug use supplies and seasonal items like toques, hats and baseball caps. The team also redesigned the Naloxone refill and distribution process to make it easier for first-time users to access the lifesaving drug and remove barriers.

The new hub has quickly caught the attention of clients, who have left rave reviews.

"Y'all are always so nice and welcoming and I love that there's no judgement whatsoever. Thank you guys for doing this for the people who are in need of the supplies and other things you offer," and,

"thank you for your services – they are greatly appreciated."

These are just some of the many comments from users highlighting the impact of the service.

The Pit Stop has also partnered with other projects, notably with the Meeting the Moment Project and creating the Test That Sh\*t: Drug Testing Study, aimed at understanding the impact of increasing the accessibility of providing BTNX fentanyl strips to those who use synthetic substances.

Other Pit Stop initiatives have caught the attention of local news outlets and prominent Winnipeg politicians. The Harm Reduction Services team's Trench Foot Prevention Shoe Drive received dozens of donations of socks and shoes and even a donation from Winnipeg Mayor Brian Bowman. Nine Circles held the shoe drive to prevent trench foot, a painful condition caused by having wet feet for an extended period. Providing proper footwear reduces the likelihood of developing the condition, especially for our under-housed community members, a community that the Harm Reduction Services team has been laser-focused on supporting during this challenging year.

## REMOVING BARRIERS FOR STBBI TESTING

Throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, Nine Circles has had to adjust the services and programs offered to ensure the safety of our community. One of the most recent adjustments made was the return of our STBBI testing initiative in our harm reduction supply distribution room. For this initiative, our STI/HIV testing nurses are on hand for an hour a day to build relationships with people who come to Nine Circles to receive harm reduction supplies, such as needles or crack kits. Our STI/HIV testing nurses offer walk-in STBBI testing, allowing clients to connect with resources, testing and care. This initiative helps removes barriers such as the need for an appointment that may otherwise limit someone from accessing health care. At Nine Circles, we recognize the need for low-barrier services and are always looking for new ways to meet our clients where they are at.

#### **COVID-19 VACCINE DISTRIBUTION**

Nine Circles staff worked together to provide COVID-19 vaccines this spring, as staff had to identify eligible patients for the AstraZeneca vaccine from a list of over 1400 clients. While doses administered were limited due to supply, we successfully administered all doses within just two days and helped protect our community from COVID-19.

Nine Circles holds its first COVID-19 vaccine clinic offering AstraZeneca to clients this spring.



# IT'S OFFICIAL: LAUNCHING MEETING THE MOMENT

Nine Circles Community Health Centre launched a new multi-year project, Meeting the Moment: Integrating Street Health, Addictions Medicine and Primary Care, this past year. Partnering with Main Street Project and funded by Health Canada, Meeting the Moment is working to create a roadmap for providing primary care for people who inject drugs and live in Winnipeg's Point Douglas and Downtown neighbourhoods. Systemic barriers can make it difficult for this population to access the care and services they deserve, and this project is working directly with the community to address their needs.

"All too often, health and social systems are designed in a way that institutionalizes barriers to care for the individuals who need it most. Meeting the Moment is an exciting initiative that allows Nine Circles and its community health partners to meaningfully engage populations who have long been isolated and work together to build a model of care that will work for the client, service provider, and community."

The project seeks to answer several key questions: What is the best way to connect people who use methamphetamines and other drugs with the services and programming we offer? How can we adapt our partnerships with other agencies to best address the needs of this priority population? What is the best practice when providing services for people who use drugs who are marginalized, isolated, and have unstable housing in Winnipeg's downtown core?

At Nine Circles, we know that we need to adapt to this population's needs and find better ways to provide primary care without barriers. This project uses community member evaluations to directly influence the direction we take

& Run to a safe virtual event. With the primary goals of reducing HIV stigma and raising funds for people with lived experience, we adapted the Red Ribbon Walk & Run into an entirely online event, featuring seven days of awareness activities to bust HIV stigma and a 50/50 ticket draw to raise funds. Awareness activities included actions such as displaying a red ribbon, painting your face with HIV awareness-themed makeup, going for a walk or run while detailing why you support those living with HIV, and sharing educational graphics about the impacts of stigma on those who use drugs. We are thrilled to report we surpassed our donation goal of \$10,000 to raise \$12,203 to support people living with HIV. As COVID-19 continues to

the 'Isms' Collectively," to share their stories of stigma. Their powerful stories helped remind event participants of the impact stigma has on people living with HIV, and the domino effect stigma has on creating barriers to accessing health care. Thank you to all peers who continue to speak up and tell their stories – your powerful voices are helping to alter our systems and fuel the drive for change.
